Scoring Guide

(ie: How to get the score you want):

Evidence that you watched the film and answered the questions. There's a bit of a commentary at the end, and some personal reaction to the material. May be not that deep, or a little on the short side (less than ¾-1 page).

(60-70% max)

- Evidence that you watched the film and answered the questions well. There's a bit of a commentary at the end, and some personal reaction to the material. There's a good 1.5 2 pages here at least. Some personal reflection and reaction is clearly here as well.
 (71-85% max)
- The same as the one above, but there's a good 2-4 pages of content here, and I can see your own thought processes and awareness in it. Perhaps there is evidence of some further research into this crazy land, or there's a bit more of you in it. You could also express how you would stop these sorts of things from happening... if you were in power in Canada or the USA. This isn't tossed together ranting, but there's thought here. (86-100%)
